
OUR GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Twige Neza Dutsinde Programme



My name is Sandrine Mutuyimana and I live in Rubavu

District. At 17, I had an unexpected pregnancy that could have derailed my dreams. My father abandoned us, and my then boyfriend pressured me to get an abortion, but I chose to keep my child. I hid my pregnancy and kept going to school until the school leadership found out and I was expelled.

I enrolled in a technical school for plumbing, despite my mother's initial resistance. Balancing school and pregnancy was tough, but I persevered. Just two days after giving birth

I took my final exam and did well, which later allowed me to secure temporary jobs that helped me provide for my child and the rest of my family.

Through Vision Jeunesse Nouvelle (with the support of Imbuto Foundation), I joined Baho Neza and participated in Parent-Adolescent Communication Forums (PAC), which helped mend my relationship with my mother.

With her support, I have returned to vocational school to pursue plumbing.

My journey with Imbuto Foundation taught me that with resilience, determination, and the necessary support, success is achievable even in the face of adversity.

Since this Niboye secondary post was established it has been a game-changer for women seeking family planning services. Women from low-income families, especially those managing small businesses, can now pass by early in the morning or in the afternoon.

This convenience means they can keep their businesses running smoothly without any interruptions. Before, they had to travel long distances to public health centres, where the long waits would throw off their entire day. Now, at our secondary post, we can offer comprehensive counselling on family planning methods to our community without such inconveniences.

My name is Leah Muhimana, I am 43-year-old and I live in Kirimbi Sector in Nyamasheke District. Life hasn't been easy, but I found hope and strength through Baho Neza Initiative brought to us by FASACO, with the support of Imbuto Foundation.

I made the difficult decision to leave an abusive marriage to protect my children, but it led me into deep depression and uncertainty.

My turning point came when I met the Abahumurizamutima (Community Based Counselors) team, who introduced me to mental health safe spaces where I learnt a lot about my rights too. Initially hesitant, I decided to join their programme, and by the end of the 15-week long sessions, I had regained strength and determination. As a single mother,

I began rebuilding my family's life, starting with saving and investing 25,000 RWF in rice farming. Despite the challenges, I managed to buy the land we once rented, and now, I earn nearly 100,000 RWF with each harvest.

I am profoundly grateful to Baho Neza's "Twite ku buzima bwo mu mutwe" programme for giving us a new beginning.

My name is Emmanuel Niyonsenga and I am the CEO and Founder of KEZEM Fashion House. Raised by a single mother, I faced many challenges growing up, as my father was killed in the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi before I was even born. Despite these hardships, I was fortunate to continue my education through university.

Even with a bachelor's degree in a different field, I chose to follow my true passion—fashion. With the support of Imbuto Foundation through the Art-Rwanda Ubuhanzi programme, I launched KEZEM Fashion House in 2020. Today, our business proudly employs 15 permanent and 5 casual workers.

Attending Imbuto Foundation's mentorship programmes and youth forums has significantly enhanced my leadership and management skills, transforming me into a more active and engaged citizen. Through these experiences, I have gained the confidence and knowledge to lead effectively and contribute meaningfully to my community.

I urge my fellow youth to take advantage of similar opportunities to grow, learn, and become leaders who drive positive change in their communities.

Currently, we have successfully reached over 20,000 university students and gained the support of 40,000 online followers. Using comic art, our initiative targets youth audiences, aiming to save lives by spreading critical information effectively. Our project has not only achieved financial success but has also established important partnerships that bolster our impact.

Entrepreneurship & Innovation Programme



Gildas Kwitonda and his company, G-Proud Company, embarked on a remarkable journey of transformation. Following coaching, training, and a financial boost of 10 million Rwf from Imbuto Foundation's Imali Agribusiness Challenge, Gildas began to reshape his business with a newfound clarity and purpose.

By truly understanding his customers and their needs, he was able to craft strategies that significantly improved engagement and service. As a result, Gildas successfully completed two mushroom production phases, leading to a substantial increase in sales of both mushroom tubes and fresh mushrooms. This growth not only boosted his business but also created job opportunities for 5 permanent employees and up to 25 casual workers, depending on the season. Gildas also became more skilled in managing financial resources, allowing him to achieve his short-term goals on time.

One of his most impressive accomplishments was using his sales income to purchase a 4,300-square-meter plot of land—a milestone that once seemed out of reach when he first joined the programme. Additionally, he generated an impressive 9 million Rwf from goods, which further fueled his business growth. This land acquisition provided a solid foundation for his future production premises, overcoming one of his biggest challenges and setting the stage for continued growth and success.




Education Programmes


Through our Education Programmes, we are committed to ensuring that children are intellectually stimulated, healthy, and safe.

This holistic approach includes improving learning outcomes through remedial support for under-performing students, supporting high-achieving students from vulnerable backgrounds, and empowering girls to excel in education as well empowering parents and the community with the right tools to nurture and protect them.

Children aged 0 to 6 and their families enrolled in model and home based ECD&F centres of the total children, **41,827** were newly enrolled in ECD spaces in 2023-2024.



Parents benefited from parenting sessions in ECD & F centres. 38,663 (8,925 male and 29,738 female) were new.

Health Programmes

Health Programmes strive to enhance public health by focusing on three key objectives: empowering citizens to make informed health choices, improving knowledge, attitude and practices related to noncommunicable diseases and mental health, and enhancing the accessibility and quality of services.

These goals are achieved by developing skilled workforces, raising awareness through targeted platforms, and upgrading supportive environments for at-risk groups.




